



SUMMARIZING NOTES



What is summarizing?

Summarizing is when we pull the most important information from our reading and re-write it in our own words. We do this to provide a snapshot of our reading.

Why do we summarize?

We summarize because it helps us to improve our memory when we read. It also helps us to understand the text better, by finding the most important words and information. Summarizing can help us to answer questions about the text because we have a more in-depth understanding of what happened.

How do we summarize?

STEP 1 - Carefully read the text paying close attention to the details

STEP 2 - Underline or re-write the most important words that you read in the text. These are usually the words that relate to the main characters, or to an important event in the text.

STEP 3 - Use the key words to determine the most important events that have happened so far in the text.

STEP 4 - Write short dot points about WHO is in the story, WHERE and WHEN the story takes place, WHAT happened in the story and HOW it was resolved.

Example

- The main characters are Bob, Jack and Fred.
- Walking through the forest at midnight.
- They get lost.
- They eventually find their way home



STEP 5 - Turn your dot points into more detailed and complex sentences, try to include a conjunction.

Example

The main characters are Bob, Jack and Fred, who are all best friends. They are walking through the gloomy forest late at night after going fishing. They manage to get terribly lost and begin wandering aimlessly before finally finding their way home just before sunrise.

STEP 6 - Read back through your sentences and make sure that there are no spelling or grammar errors. Do your sentences give an accurate review of the text?
