01

Set up a nominating committee.

Select current board members who are well-connected within the community. This group of trusted advisors will dedicate time to assessing the board's strengths and weaknesses. Then, they'll locate qualified candidates to fill any gaps.

02

Consider your volunteers.

These individuals are already committed to your organization, have worked to promote your cause, and understand your organization's backend processes. Look for those who possess admirable skills that would serve your board well.

03

Turn to current donors.

Donors are another excellent source of candidates since they already have a clear commitment to your cause. Look at major and recurring donors as these individuals demonstrate a pattern of consistent support.

04

Broaden your search to the community.

You're not limited to your current network. Go beyond existing advocates and extend a warm welcome to prominent business leaders and outstanding volunteers at similar organizations.
