

- **Constituents want to see Congress act to stop migrant children from being separated from their parents and most favor a Congressional candidate who is against the “zero tolerance” policy.** By a 29-point margin (61% support/32% oppose), voters support Congress acting to stop migrant children from being separated from their parents. This includes large majorities of Democrats (72% support) and independents (72% support), as well as nearly half of Republican voters (43% support). Even 34% of self-described conservative Republicans and 39% of voters with a favorable view of Trump say they support Congressional action to stop these migrant children from being separated from their parents. And when given the choice between two candidates – one who supports the “zero tolerance” policy and one who opposes it – 54% of voters say they would choose the Congressional candidate who opposes the “zero tolerance” policy, including 63% of independents and a quarter (27%) of GOP voters.
- **Voters expect more accountability and transparency from the Office of Refugee Resettlement and the Department of Health and Human Services.** Two-thirds of voters (63%) support Congress acting to increase the accountability and transparency of ORR and HHS regarding these offices role in the separation of migrant children from their parents, with half (50%) who “strongly support” Congress acting. There is also bipartisan support for increasing the accountability and transparency of ORR and HHS, with Democrats (66% support), independents (64% support), and Republicans (61% support) agreeing – including 63% of conservative Republicans and 52% of voters who have a favorable view of President Trump.
- **Voters prefer a member of Congress who supports legislation to make the Office of Refugee more transparent and accountable.** More than three-quarters of voters (77%) say they would be more favorable toward their member of Congress if they support legislation that will make the Office of Refugee Resettlement more transparent, including 67% of conservative Republicans and 60% of voters with a favorable view of Trump. Seven in ten voters (69%) say they would be more favorable toward their member of Congress if they support an investigation into the conditions of the facilities where migrant children are being held – including 57% of conservative Republicans and 53% of voters with a favorable view of Trump. Seven in ten (68%) would be more favorable toward their member of Congress if they called the Director of the ORR to testify before Congress about the Trump policy of separating children from their parents. And a large majority of voters (63%) would be more favorable toward their member of Congress if they supported legislation to stop the Trump Administration from separating migrant children from their parents – including nearly half (45%) of GOP voters.

ABOUT THIS POLL: Global Strategy Group conducted a survey of 402 likely general election voters in Florida’s 26th Congressional District from June 12 to 17, 2018. The results of this survey have a margin of error of +/-4.9%. Care has been taken to ensure the geographic and demographic divisions of the expected electorate are properly represented based on historical turnout.
